Summer is the perfect time to apply for a grant or fellowship—many deadlines occur in the summer and fall, and you finally have the time to concentrate on crafting the perfect proposal. I hope the opportunities listed here will give you some good ideas and help you shape your research agenda. Feel free to come and talk with me about your research; together, we can figure out the best funding strategy for you.

The grants world hasn't gone untouched by the current economic downturn. The decline in many foundations' endowments is similar to what colleges are experiencing, and this has resulted in the suspension, postponement, or refocusing of many grant competitions. On the bright side, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act infused over \$10 billion into the grant-making budgets of NSF and NIH and stimulated a flurry of new grant opportunities—and applications (nearly causing the grants.gov system to crash). Whether for federal or private grants, competition will be increasingly intense as more and more of us apply for these ever scarcer grant funds. It is more important than ever to take the time to prepare a *compelling and innovative* proposal that will outshine all the others. Let's work together to make your proposals as competitive as possible.

The number of awards varies each year according to total funds available. Over \$300,000 is available for the 2010-11 competition. Awards are made in all fields. Applicants must have a well-defined research or study project that makes a stay in Scandinavia essential. Projects should be planned to fall within the summer 2010 - summer 2011 period.

Fulbright Specialists Program

The Fulbright Specialists Program (FSP) promotes linkages between U.S. academics and professionals and their counterparts at universities abroad. The program is designed to award grants to qualified U.S. faculty and professionals, in select disciplines, to engage in short-term collaborative 2 to 6 week projects at higher education institutions in over 100 countries worldwide. International travel costs and an honorarium are funded by the U.S. Department of State Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs.

Participating host universities cover grantee in-country expenses or provide in-kind services. Project activities focus on the strengthening and development needs of higher education institutions and do not fund personal research. Eligible activities include teacher training, short-term lecturing, conducting seminars, special conferences or workshops, as well as collaborating on

curriculum planning, institutional and/or faculty development.

Summer Stipends support individuals pursuing advanced research that is of value to scholars and general audiences in the humanities. Recipients usually produce articles, monographs, books, digital materials, archaeological site reports, translations, editions, or other scholarly tools. Summer Stipends support full-time work on a humanities project for a period of two months. The program accepts applications from researchers, teachers, and writers, whether they have an institutional affiliation or not. Applicants with college or university affiliations must, however, be nominated by their institutions. This process is coordinated by the Provost.

Fellowships support college and university teachers pursuing research aimed specifically at deepening their core knowledge in the humanities to improve their undergraduate teaching. The program has three broad goals: 1) to improve the depth and quality of humanities education in the United States; 2) to strengthen the link between research and teaching in the humanities; and 3) to foster excellence in undergraduate instruction. Projects must improve an existing undergraduate course that has been taught in at least THREE different terms and will continue to be taught by the applicant.

In addition, the committee is emphasizing multidisciplinary projects that address environmental issues (e.g., loss of biodiversity and habitat, effects of human-population pressures).
