## Coronavirus News

Walla Walla County had one new confirmed coronavirus case in the past 24 hours. That brings the number of confirmed cases in the county to 24. The Walla Walla County Department of Health reports that seven patients have recovered from the virus. There are no confirmed cases on the Whitman campus.

Later today, Washington Gov. Jay Inslee will hold a news conference to discuss what's next for Washington. Inslee said a huge factor in reopening the economy is testing and the state's ability to complete tests at the scale and with the immediacy necessary. A shortage of supplies, trained workers and reliable tests is a huge barrier that needs to be addressed.

### Tips for Avoiding Phishing Scams

Even though phishing and scam emails are always hitting our mailboxes, some scammers are leveraging the concern and confusion surrounding the recent COVID event. Now is a good time to remind yourself to watch for the potential signs of a fraudulent email:

- sense of urgency
- suspicious sender address
- generic greeting
- links to forms or logins
- suspicious attachments

It's always good to double-check with someone else if a message doesn't seem normal. Whitman College employees have information security awareness modules available that provide a good foundation for staying safe online. ## Campus Resources

### Use Secure File Sharing Systems

As many of us adjust to working remotely, one common challenge is maintaining good security when transferring confidential documents or private information electronically. The Human Resources staff is using Whitman's [Secure File Exchange](#) or [ShareFile](#) system. If you want to send attachments containing secure information to Human Resources, (ex. SSN, driver license numbers, passport documents, financial information, etc.) please contact Human Resources to initiate the secure transfer process.

Additionally, if your role on campus involves the need to transfer sensitive information regularly, you should email the [Information Security Office](#) to setup your own ShareFile account. Whitman's ShareFile system allows transfers and requests involving both Whitman account holders as well as people without whitman.edu accounts. Emails are exchanged, but the attachments are handled through a separate download/upload process designed to keep sensitive files out of your inbox and sent messages folder.
